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SYLLABUS and ASSESSMENT

Entrance Requirement

We welcome participants who are eager to enhance their multidisciplinary competence. Admission is open (but not limited to) students with the following background: Aesthetics, Arts, Cognitive Science, Cultural Studies, Literature, Linguistics, Medicine, Nursing, Philosophy, Psychology, Social Sciences, Social Work, Sociology.

Contents

The PsyHuman Summer School offers seminars and workshops that draw on a wide range of approaches to well-being and inclusion, including those of cognitive, psychological, and bio-medical sciences as well as cultural, gender, law, literary, philosophical, and sociological studies.

Lectures and workshops will address the following issues:

- the psychological humanities
- mindfulness and contemplative practices for well-being
- neuroaesthetics and the arts
- social robots and AI
- design for social inclusion
- love in the arts, artivism and neuroscience
- gender non-conformity in sports
- inclusion and exclusion of LGBTQIA+ people
- sexuality and disability
- hunger, pain and other bodily states
- narrative medicine and narrative competence for well-being and affiliation
- madness in literature

Teaching and Learning Methods and Activities

The two-week programme is articulated in seminars, workshops, and outdoor activities.

- <u>Seminars and workshops</u> will be based on the principles and practices of participatory didactics: lecturers from different disciplines (bio-medical, cultural, gender, law, literary, philosophical, psychological, and sociological studies) will actively engage participants, who will be encouraged to share their own knowledge and competencies in the classroom, thus triggering a virtuous multidisciplinary learning process.
- <u>Narrative Medicine Workshop</u>: Group activities and discussion sessions will be carried out, based on the signature practices of Narrative Medicine (*i.e.*, close reading, attentive listening, self-reflection, writing to a prompt, storytelling and sharing).





Outdoor activities: All-day excursion to Arte Sella: The contemporary mountain; half-day guided tour of Rovereto; half-day excursion at the lake; and meditative-aesthetic workshop at the Modern and Contemporary Art Museum of Rovereto (MART).

Objectives and Learning Outcomes

The 2023 International Summer School on Psychological Humanities (PsyHuman) aims at fostering a model of individual and collective well-being that encompasses physical, mental, and socio-cultural determinants of health, while challenging the dominant narratives of the 'ideal' mind- and body-type.

By the end of the course, students will:

- i. have enhanced awareness of multiple (subjective, culture-bound, speculative, and also empirical, evidence-based, objective) perspectives on well-being and inclusion promotion;
- ii. be able to make connections between the approaches of the arts and humanities, those of psychology and bio-medical sciences, and their own field of study and knowledge;
- iii. have reflected on the role of psychology and of the arts and humanities to promote well-being and to build inclusive communities.

Moreover, participants are engaged in narrative medicine workshops, which aim at developing life skills that can be beneficial in times of strain (*i.e.* narrative competence, affiliation, respect for differences, empathy) and that can help face physical, emotional, and socio-cultural challenges.

Workload, Requirements and Assessment Criteria

Participation to in-presence activities and to the online post summer school session are **compulsory** for **all external participants**, who will be awarded a Transcript of Records with **6 ECTS** with a **final evaluation mark**.

2 extra ECTS can be awarded by submitting an extra assignment – an essay.

The final evaluation and grading will be based on the following assessment criteria:

- capacity to trace multidisciplinary connections;
- capacity to re-elaborate from an original critical perspective the issues addressed in the seminars/workshops;
- conceptual framing;
- coherence and argument building.

a. In-presence attendance (compulsory)

Active in-class participation (seminars and workshops) will be the base for the in-progress assessment of the learning process, which will take into consideration the following criteria:

- progress towards the acquisition of the learning objectives,
- interaction with peers and lecturers,
- active participation in class,
- commitment to carrying out the given tasks.

b. Online-session presentation and discussion (compulsory)

Assignment: Post-summer school presentation and discussion of the student's personal interpretation of the psychological humanities and of a chosen topic, with reference to the issues addressed in at least one seminar/workshop and to the student's field of study.

c. Extra assignment – Essay (+2 credits – optional)

Participants who want to earn the 2 extra ECTS are required to submit an essay. Before the conclusion of the 2-week school, please discuss your chosen essay topic with the academic supervisor.

This is to be a thought-provoking assignment, which aims at stimulating students to independently delve into one of the topics addressed during the School.

By mid-August, please send for the academic supervisor's approval **a one-page outline** (Word or PDF) of the agreed essay topic, methodology and preliminary sources.

By 30 September, please send to the academic supervisor the final essay (Word or PDF). Paper length: min 4,000 – max 6,000 words (including footnotes and bibliography).

Assessment criteria

The assignments will be assessed according to the following criteria:

- conceptual framing, coherence and argument building;
- capacity to re-elaborate from an original critical perspective the issues addressed in the seminars/workshops;
- capacity to trace multidisciplinary connections.
