



**Announcement of selection for Doctoral positions in the Doctoral School in
“Humanities, Philosophy, History and Cultural Heritage”
25th cycle**

In accordance with Law no. 210 of 3.07.1998 and in particular, art. 4, which assigns the organization of doctoral schools to universities given the general criteria stipulated by ministerial regulations;
In accordance with the Ministerial Decree no. 224 of 30.04.1999, regarding the general criteria to be followed by individual universities in the organization of Doctoral Schools;
In accordance with the Decree by the Prime Minister of 9.04.2001, and subsequent amendments on the general criteria for uniform treatment regarding the right to higher education;
In accordance with the Charter of the University of Trento and in particular art. 12, paragraph 9;
In accordance with the University Regulations for Doctoral Schools, issued with the Rector's Decree no. 997 of 16.12.2003; and subsequently modified with Rector's Decree no. 359 of 19.04.2006;
In accordance with the proposal of the Department of Philosophy, History and Cultural Heritage;
In accordance with the report of the internal Evaluation Committee of 16.01.2007 on the requirements for the doctoral schools proposed;
In accordance with the resolution made jointly by the Academic Senate and the Scientific Research Committee on the 4.03.2009

DECREES

Art. 1 - INSTITUTION

The University of Trento announces the 25th cycle of the Doctoral Programme in Humanities, Philosophy, History and Cultural Heritage (SDSU) for the academic year 2009/2010, in co-operation with “Fondazione Trentino Università” and “Museo Tridentino di Scienze Naturali”.

Length: three years

The final dissertation could be wrote in one of the above mentioned languages with the previous approval of the Academic Committee. Anyway the final discussion should be in Italian.

Selection for **12** doctoral positions, **6** of which are covered with a study grant is announced.

The number of grant-assisted positions may be increased by funds from universities, public research institutions or qualified private organizations that are become available after the publication of this announcement and before the beginning of the competition. Art. 2 – ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Applications for doctoral positions are accepted from candidates, regardless of gender, age and nationality, who have an Italian “laurea magistrale” in compliance with Ministerial Decree no. 509 of 3.11.1999 as amended, a university degree of the previously enforced Italian regulations, or an equivalent academic degree obtained abroad.

Applicants who have a foreign degree which has not been officially recognized as equivalent to an Italian degree must submit a request for equivalence in the application. This is done by adding the following documents:

- degree certificate (according to Presidential Decree no. 445 of 28.12.2000 regarding self-certifications for EU citizens)
- translation into English of the degree certificate, with exams taken, grades obtained and signed by the applicant to enable the Doctorate School Committee to declare its equivalence, for the sole purpose of being admitted to the selection of this call.

Applications are also accepted from students who expect to complete their degree **by 30th of September 2009**. They need to present, together with their application:

- certificate of enrolment in the University with list of exams taken and grades obtained for each exam;
- a statement from their thesis supervisor or from the University Registrar's Office declaring that the student is expected to obtain the degree **within the 30th of September 2009**.

Then they must be able to present the degree certificate (or a self-declaration that the degree has been conferred, according to Presidential Decree no. 445 of 28.12.2000 only for EU citizens) to the Secretariat of the Doctoral School (fax number 0039 0461 881751) **by the 9th of October 2009**.

Only admitted non-EU applicants holding a non-Italian qualification and admitted EU applicants holding a non-EU qualification must also present their degree certificate along with exams taken and grades, translated and authenticated by an Italian consulate, embassy or diplomatic representative in the country where the degree was issued, and the respective declaration of validity (“Dichiarazione di Valore”), no later than **2nd of November 2009**.

Art. 3 – THE DOCTORATE PROGRAMME

The Doctoral School aims to train experts in the field of philosophical, historical and cultural heritage studies.



The School has two specialised curricula:

1) Analysis and history of the territory and of landscape shapes

This curricula focuses on the study and analysis of the relationship between the human being and the environment in its historical evolution and structural representations. This analysis takes into consideration both the results of the environmental anthropization and the consequence of environmental changes on the human condition and cultural development.

2) Studies and research on "the human condition"

This curricula focuses on the "conditio humana", which entails the different dimensions of human existence. Particularly the research fields are the rational, ethical, political, literary and religious elements which have influenced the development and the codification of the concept of human being and human community.

The main instruments of this research are the philosophical, historical and cultural studies focusing on the classical texts of our civilization (from the Jewish and Greek-Latin origin to the Modern and Contemporary age).

Each cycle of the Doctoral School focuses on a specific topic. The candidates will be required to produce a research project on this subject. For the 25th cycle the chosen topic is "**Spaces, Forms and Symbols of Human co-existence**" which is described in the Annex A of this announcement.

During the three-year course each student must achieve a total amount of 180 credits as follows:

- **120 credits** for research activity on the subject of the final dissertation
- **60 credits** for educational activity including seminars, specific courses or lectures, workshop, periods spent in foreign or Italian universities or research institutions and taking the final test at the end of each academic year.

Anyway at least a period of three months should be spent in a foreign institution.

Doctoral students could be required to attend specific workshop to improve the knowledge of foreign languages or other kind of skills as well.

To be admitted to the following academic year the student must achieve at least 2/3 of the total credits required for the chosen didactic programme unless the Academic Committee decides otherwise (f.i. to allow the student to spend a longer time abroad for research).

The programme is the following one:

1st year

- a) course concerning the methods of research;
- b) a seminar on the topic of the project;
- c) a seminar among the ones of the curricula.

At the end of the first year the doctoral students are required to submit the final version of the thesis project and to have acquired the main research methods using the common scientific means (f.i. concept definition, book reviews, interdisciplinary bibliography).

2nd year

- a) a seminar on the topic of the project;
- b) a seminar among the ones of the curricula.

At the end of the second year the doctoral students are required to submit and discuss the thesis they are going to refine.

3rd year

- a) a seminar on the topic of the project;
- b) a seminar among the ones of the curricula.

The third year the doctoral students are required to work on the final version of their thesis. They are allowed to spend period abroad for research reasons.

Within the third year the doctoral students have to give a seminar on the topic of their thesis. This exam is public and it will be held in front of a Commission (including at least two members of the Academic Committee and the tutor). This seminar allows the doctoral student to be admitted to the final exam.

Art. 4 – APPLICATION

Application should be made using the form attached to this announcement.

The application, including all the annexes required, must arrive at the University of Trento **by the 17th of September 2009** in one of the following ways:

The University of Trento does not take responsibility for loss of applications from mistakes in writing the address nor from possible postal or telegraphic delays or problems.

Applications received after September 17, 2009 will not be considered even if posted beforehand.

According to Italian Law no. 104/92, art. 20 and to Italian Law no. 68/99, art. 16, para. 1, special needs applicants are expected to explicitly state in their application whether they require special assistance or extra time during the examinations. Under Legislative Decree 196/03, all information will be kept confidential.

Admission application Annexes:

- Photocopy of the applicant's ID or passport;
- degree certificate or degree self-certification (according to Presidential Decree no. 445 of 28.12.2000 concerning EU citizens), with a list of the examinations successfully passed and scores obtained in each examination. Except for the candidates who should not have gained the degree within the application deadline as provided in art. 2 of the announcement.

For those candidates who have a foreign qualification that has not already been officially recognized as equivalent to an Italian degree: translation into English of the degree certificate with exams taken and grades obtained, all signed by the applicant, in order to enable the Doctoral School Committee to declare its equivalence, for the sole purpose of being admitted to this selection;

- **a single** research project proposal concerning one of the specialised curricula on the topic: Spaces, Forms and Symbols of Human Co-existence (see the attached text of the project); candidates who wish to be considered for one of the reserved scholarships (on the research topic "*Ethics and Work. Questions of Professional Ethics between Tradition and Pluralism: The Case of Trentino in the European Context*" and on the research topic "*The Molina di Ledro archaeological site in the framework of Alpine lake-dwelling settlements*") are required to indicate their interest for one the reserved grants in the application form. During the oral exam the Commission will evaluate their eligibility for the specific research topic. Candidates offered a scholarship for reserved research area may not decline the offer.

The research project must be drawn up according to the following steps:

- title;
 - aims of the project (max 200 characters);
 - originality of the project compared to the nowadays status (max 6.000 characters);
 - methodology and timing of the research (max 1000 characters);
 - activities the candidate would like to realise on the subject (f.i. seminar, research, meetings – max 1000 characters);
 - foreign Universities/Institutes where the candidates plans to spend a research period and professor experts to be invited for seminars or as supervisor (max 1000 characters);
 - bibliography (max 4.000 max);
- curriculum vitae et studiorum (awarded degrees, 1st and 2nd level master, date and grade);
 - any certificates of knowledge of foreign languages (e.g. TOEFL, Proficiency Certificate or other);
 - Any other documents that could be useful for the evaluation (publications, grants, awards, period research etc).

If applicants should wish to add documents after their application was sent, this material must reach the University **no later than the 17th of September 2009** in one of the ways listed in the letters a) or b) of this article. The applicant's name, Doctoral School Humanities, Philosophy, History and Cultural Heritage and the subject ("Integrazione domanda") must be clearly printed on any communication with the University.

The University of Trento has the right to check, even to spot check, declarations and documents provided by the candidates, according to art. 71 and following articles of the Presidential Decree no. 445 of 28.12.2000. Candidates who do not fulfil the requirements will be excluded from the selection for the Doctoral Programme.



Art. 5 – SELECTION

The selection process is designed to assess the candidate's basic knowledge and aptitude towards research in the chosen specific scientific area.

The selection consists of:

- assessment of curriculum vitae and qualifications according to Art. 4;
- evaluation of the research project;
- oral exam.

The Admissions Committee can assign each candidate a total of 100 points as follows:

- 50 points for the assessment of qualifications and research project;
- 50 points for the oral exam.

In order to be admitted to the oral examination candidates must reach a minimum score of 30 after the assessment of qualifications and research project.

The list of those candidates admitted to the oral examination will be published, after the qualifications assessment, on the web page: <http://portale.unitn.it/en/ec/phd/hust.htm>

The oral exam will focus on assessing the candidates' skills and aptitude for research and their motivation.

For candidates wishing to be considered for one of the reserved scholarship too the interview will also involve an evaluation of their skill and knowledge in the field concerned .

Applicants must present a valid identification document in order to be admitted to the oral examination.

The oral exam is successfully passed with a minimum score of 30 points.

In case of applicants not residing in Italy, who want to sit the entrance exam in their home countries, the oral exam will be held by phone or videoconference in the same days, subject to approval by the Admissions Committee. The applicant must provide (using the form in Annex B) the address of a University, Institute or Embassy, indicating the name of an officer who can identify him/her before the selection.

The selection exam will be held in Italian or in a foreign language chosen among English, French, German and Spanish by the candidate.

During the oral examination the candidate knowledge of Italian and of one foreign languages among English, French, German and Spanish will be evaluated too.

At least 20 days before the date of the oral examination, time and location of it will be displayed on the website: <http://portale.unitn.it/en/ec/phd/hust.htm> as laid down in Art. 20 of the University Regulations for Doctoral Schools.

Art. 6 – PROGRAMME OF THE EXAMINATION

The oral examination will explore applicants' general knowledge on various subjects and will focus on the research project as well.

As concerns the reserved scholarship the interview will also involve an evaluation of candidate's skill and knowledge in the field concerned the specific grant.

Art. 7 – ADMISSIONS COMMITTEE

Upon hearing the Doctoral School Committee the Rector appoints the Admissions Committee. It consists of three members chosen among Italian and foreign tenure professors and researchers, who are experts in the scientific areas of the Doctoral School. The Committee may also include two experts, who may be foreign, from public and private national and international research centres.

Having held the qualifications evaluation and the oral examination, the Committee will draw up a merit-based ranking on the scores obtained by the applicants.

The final ranking of the candidates will be posted on the website: <http://portale.unitn.it/en/ec/phd/hust.htm>

Through publication of such list, notification concerning the proceedings is considered to be fulfilled.

Applicants admitted to the School will not receive personal communication of their results.

Art. 8 – ADMISSION TO THE DOCTORAL SCHOOL

Applicants will be admitted to the Doctoral School according to their position in the final ranking and till all available and eligible positions have been filled. If the candidates are equally worthy of admission, the student's economic situation will be evaluated for positions that include a grant, in accordance with the Decree of the President of the Council of Ministers (D.P.C.M.) of 9.04.2001 as amended, for positions not assigned a grant, the youngest student shall be given priority.



If an eligible applicant withdraws before the beginning of the programme, the applicant next in rank will be offered the position.

If an eligible applicant withdraws or is excluded in the first three-month term of the first year, the Doctoral School Committee may decide to fill the vacancy with another candidate next in rank in the final score list.

According to art. 19, paragraph 3 of the University Regulations for Doctoral Schools and according to previous Doctoral School Committee resolutions, the Admissions Committee may admit to the School up to 20% of the total assigned places, candidates who are eligible in the general ranking, if they belong to the following categories:

- applicants from non-E.U. countries who have been awarded any kind of grant;
- applicants from a country with a specific intergovernmental agreement with Italy, on the basis of a bilateral agreement between the University of Trento and the foreign university (with no obligatory financial burden for the University of Trento);
- short-listed applicants who have been awarded grants under Law 449/97, Art. 51 ("Assegni di ricerca").

Art. 9 – ENROLMENT

Eligible applicants who are admitted to the School should forward their enrolment application to:

"Università degli Studi di Trento – Direzione Didattica e Servizi agli Studenti - Ufficio Dottorati ed Esami di Stato, Via Inama n. 5 – 38100 Trento – ITALIA" within 15 days of the date of the publication of the final ranking at the webpage: <http://portale.unitn.it/en/ec/phd/hust.htm>

If applicable, the payment receipt of the provincial tax for the right to university study (TDS) must be attached to the application.

In the application (forms are available at the Ufficio Dottorati ed Esami di Stato and on the website: <http://portale.unitn.it/en/ec/phd.htm>), candidates should:

- ask / ask not to be awarded a grant (including successful applicants who are not eligible for a grant in case an applicant eligible for a grant gives up his/her place);
- declare that they already received / did not receive a grant by the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs or by other Italian or foreign institution;
- declare that they have / have not already been awarded (even for one year only) a grant for an Italian Doctorate Programme;
- declare that they are not already enrolled and promise not to enrol in any other program for a diploma, degree, an Italian "Scuola di Specializzazione", Doctorate or Specialization degree, whether of the 1st or 2nd level, for the duration of this Doctorate Programme; if they are, they will stop attending such a School before the start of the Programme;
- declare that they are / are not employed by the Italian public sector;
- declare to request the Doctoral School Committee authorization for any occupation;
- undertake to inform the University of any changes of their residence or address.

Non-EU applicants admitted to the Programme who have a foreign qualification and EU-applicants admitted to the Programme who have a university degree obtained in a non-EU country must attach their degree with exams taken and grades obtained, translated and authenticated by an Italian Consulate, Embassy or Diplomatic Representative in the country of the university that issued the degree and its declaration of validity ("Dichiarazione di Valore") **no later than the 2nd of October 2009**.

Eligible applicants admitted to the School who do not send their application **within 15 days following the publication date of the ranking** on the web page: <http://portale.unitn.it/en/ec/phd/hust.htm> lose the right to enrol and their corresponding position will be offered to the next candidate on the list.

Art. 10– GRANTS

Grants are assigned on the basis of the ranking of applicants drawn up by the Admissions Committee.

Candidates offered a reserved scholarship for research in a specific area may not decline the offer.

If an applicant forfeits his/her right to the grant, the next eligible applicant on the list will be offered the grant.

In case of "restricted" scholarship for specific area of research the scholarship will be offered to the next candidate on the ranking with the required eligibility.

The gross amount of the scholarship is Euro 13.638,47 per year¹.

¹ At the moment of the publication of this announcement the current Italia Law states that the doctoral scholarship is subject to social security contributions (INPS 17% or 25,72%. One third of the tax is chargeable to the doctoral student) according to art 2(26) of Law no. 335/95 as amended.



Grants are normally paid bi-monthly and in advance, with the exception of undue payments in case the student is expelled or suspended.

Grants cannot be combined with other scholarships, except those awarded by national or foreign scientific institutes deemed appropriate for the research activities carried out by the doctoral student.

The scholarship will be increased by 50% for research periods spent abroad authorized by the coordinator or by the School Committee.

Grants are awarded for the whole duration of the program after the Doctoral School Committee's confirmation of the results achieved every year by the doctoral student.

A doctoral student's failure to attend the program for over thirty days will lead to grant suspension.

In case a doctoral student should decide not to carry on with the studies during the academic year, the student forfeits the right to use the grant for the amount which has not yet paid out.

Art. 11 – DOCTORAL STUDENTS RIGHTS AND DUTIES

Doctoral students must attend the doctoral programme and carry out research and studies according to the schedule and the regulation laid out by the Doctoral School Committee, as specified in Art. 3 of the present announcement.

Students taking part in a co-tutelle programme are required to carry out study and research activities in compliance with the agreement signed with the foreign university.

The Doctoral School Committee may decide to exclude students from the doctoral Programme:

- a) in case of a negative evaluation by the Doctoral School Committee concerning the admission to the following year of study or a negative evaluation by the Doctoral School Committee regarding a student's participation in School activities and studies;
- b) the student accepts any form of employment without the Doctoral School Committee's authorisation;
- c) in case of unjustified and extended absences.

Students who are expelled from the School will forfeit their scholarship.

In case of externally funded scholarships concerning specific areas of research are binding for the candidate who have been awarded them.

For the duration of the Doctoral Programme, doctoral students are insured by the University against accidents and civil liability that occur in circumstances concerning the doctoral Programme.

A public service employee admitted to the Doctoral School may request leave of absence for reasons of study for the whole duration of the doctoral course, without allowances, and may benefit from the scholarship, if the required conditions are met. In the case of admission to a doctoral course without a scholarship, or if the candidate has declined the scholarship, the person on leave of absence enjoys the economic remuneration and social insurance and retirement benefits enjoyed by the public administration where he/she is employed. Should the employee terminate employment in public administration in the two years succeeding his / her having obtained the doctoral title, the amounts paid during the course of the doctoral studies will be claimed back.

Art. 12 – DOCTORAL TITLE CONFERRAL

The doctoral title, conferred by the Rector, is awarded when students pass the final examination at the end of the three-year doctoral Programme.

The Examination Committee will be appointed by the Rector, upon the advice of the Doctoral School Committee and in accordance with the University Regulations for Doctoral Schools.

The issuing of the degree certificate is conditional upon the candidate providing the University archive with copies of the final dissertation. The University archives will ensure public accessibility and the proper conservation of the printed thesis. The University will see to it that the National Libraries in Rome and Florence will be provided with a copy of the dissertation, as required by Italian law.

Art. 13 – PERSONAL DATA

The University of Trento, in accordance with Legislative Decree 196/03 "Italian Personal Data Protection Code", may use applicants' personal data only for the purpose of selection procedures and for institutional reasons.

Participation in the present selections entails, in observance of the above-mentioned law, that the applicant allows the University of Trento to publish his/her personal data concerning the results of the selection procedure on the University website.

Annex A

Project for the 25th doctoral cycle: Spaces, Forms and Symbols of Human Co-existence

The Doctoral School in “Humanities, Philosophy, History and Cultural Heritage” invites all its candidates to present, by the date established by the university authority, a research project on the interdisciplinary topic: Spaces, Forms, and Symbols of Human Co-Existence.

Co-existence is documented throughout the most ancient times and may be found in a variety of urban forms of life. Although it is not an exclusively human phenomenon, the history of the transformation of and the adaptation to the environment by men and women over time – understood as history of the changing environment, humanization of space, and management of territories – documents the human characteristics in organizing together for optimizing resources, sharing tasks, and expressing the values and meanings of existence through behaviour, visual arts, music, show and theatre expressions, dramaturgy, literature, historical memory and philosophical questioning.

The interdisciplinary theme, which our Doctoral School has proposed, integrates the different scholarly approaches to human co-existence and puts in perspective the chronological differences, from prehistorical times through the contemporary period.

A first field of research is the exploration of traditions, the models of memory, collective symbols, and the shared ethos, without which no human experience of human organization would be possible. The methodologies and the techniques for maintaining the memory of administrative and juridical facts (Goody) in their evolutive aspects – from pre-written archives to digital technology – and, more in general, the variety of individual and collective forms of remembering and forgetting constitute a first field of research, which is important in defining an ethics of memory in order to forge cultural identities and prescribe social goals.

A second field of research is the complex fact of the acceptance and rejection of those who do not belong to a given society (the clan, the tribe, the “church,” the ethnic group, the State, etc). It is the issue being different, or the “other” in relation to the same, the mainstream culture or civilization. This problem is common to any form of co-existence. Many disciplines may converge and contribute to this topic, including human geography, archaeology, cultural anthropology, together with the history of pedagogy and of political theories. History shows that all human societies are cases of osmosis, of “metabolism” between an inside and an outside, between identical and different, between local and foreign. These dynamics would also explain the evolution of human forms of social aggregations as symbolic places for the composition of this fragmented plurality. In this perspective it is possible to locate the issue of the most desirable models for human subjectivity and for styles of life, which represent an important chapter of the history of ideas from Plato to the humanistic thought of Renaissance, from Spinoza to Kant and Hegel, through the most recent debate.

A third field of research is the study of the decisional processes and of the rules and the institutions that all organized and economically productive co-existence requires, and has always required, in order to regulate, if not prevent, conflicts and tensions. From the ancient polis to contemporary Western societies, all experiences of human connivance have faced some kind of “conflict of values” between liberty and equality, privilege and justice, recreational and utilitarian dimensions of life. This is even more so today, in an epic of the “end of great narratives” (Lyotard, Derrida), when collective life is no longer founded on a unique, communitarian metaphysical ethos. On the contrary, it is founded on the individual freedom to choose any personal system of values. Today the conflict is not only justified by the traditional economic and political causes, but also by ethical and symbolic motivations. This conflict is in particular shown in the form of the competition between the many bodies that elaborate and offer meanings of live on frontiers such as bio-ethics, ecology, and sustainable development. The relationship between ethical and religious pluralism on the one hand, and neutrality on the other, of public life constitutes a cutting edge topic of research, which involves many dimensions of co-existence today, as is seen from current debates between global intellectuals such as J. Habermas, R. Remond, R. Dawkins, C. Taylor, M. Nussbaum, M. Gauchet, and E.-W. Boeckenfoerde. In this perspective artistic creativity also plays an important role, as has from ancient times through today, for example in the forms of redesigning the horizons of the city and its relationship to the environment and landscape (urban and civic planning).

The aesthetical experiences of performative arts, e.g. the theatre, implies a variety of aggregations and participations which re-define the place of the individual within his/her community. The dynamical relationship between the individual and the community indeed grounds every reflection on artistic communication, historical memory, and the theories of representation, which are based on a complex interconnection between roles and languages.

The Doctoral School is open and eager to explore new frontiers in scientific research, theoretical and applied, as well as diachronic and synchronic. It will help deepen the reflection on the human experience of co-existence and its problems to enrich the academic life of our Department and the University at large.
